Eritrea forms a part of the Horn of Africa. The region was ruled successively by the Ottomans, Tigray Kingdom, Egyptians, Italy, and Britain, and was part of Ethiopia before it gained independence in 1993. As a result of decades of war and continual drought, large numbers of the Eritrea-born, and those born in nearby refugee camps in Sudan and Zaire, arrived in Australia in the last decade or so under a special humanitarian program.

At the 2006 Census, there were 1,215 Eritrea-born persons in Victoria (60.3% of Australia's total), increasing by 22.0% from 996 persons in 2001. Only 14.0% of Victoria's Eritrea-born had arrived in Australia prior to 1991. The Eritrea-born community was distributed throughout metropolitan Melbourne, with distinct concentrations in the local government areas of Moonee Valley (20.7%); Melbourne City (10.7%); Maribyrnong (9.4%); Brimbank (7.6%); and Greater Dandenong (7.5%). There were 1,599 persons who identified with Eritrean ancestry.


The Eritrea-born showed a balanced age profile: 56.2% were aged 26-44 years; 22.8% were aged 45-64 years. The median age was 37 years, similar to that of the total Victorian population. The gender ratio was slightly biased towards females, with 91 males to 100 females, due to a number of arrivals under the Women at Risk humanitarian program. Over half (51.6%) spoke Arabic at home and 28.5% spoke Tigrinya. A significant percentage (19.4%) assessed themselves as speaking English not well or not at all. Two-thirds (67.6%) of the Eritrea-born were Muslim; and 20.5% followed a variety of Orthodox Christian religions. Most (81.7%) held Australian Citizenship, compared to 67.5% for the total overseas-born population in Victoria.


